

#### DIGITAL TRANSITION UPDATE

The Digital Transition continues to be a big hit. Our digital collection has grown to over 2,500 titles, and we get more new books in every day. We have sent out close to 400 Digital Talking Book Players so far. Those who are using them are raving about how easy they are to use and how good the sound quality is.

If you do not have yours yet, and do not reside in a prison or state hospital (we're still working on policy for institutionalized patrons), call or e-mail us today to get your digital machine. We are receiving new allotments of machines every month, and we want to make sure all our patrons receive one. We will need to have any overdue cassette books returned before you can begin digital service.

Are you computer-friendly, or do you know someone who is and could help you? You can take advantage of over 15,000 additional titles (including magazines) available through BARD (Braille & Audio Reading Download). Give us a call and we can tell you about it and help you sign up. You will need high-speed internet access (dial-up unfortunately will not be successful) and an e-mail address to sign up. You will download the books to your computer, then "unzip" the files and extract them to a purchased flash drive or purchased blank NLS

digital cartridge. The flash drive or cartridge then plugs directly into your digital Talking Book player. We have quite a number of patrons participating in BARD and actively downloading and listening to books and magazines.

Has it been a long time since you listened to a Talking Book? Is your cassette player gathering dust in a corner? Now is the time to come back to the joy of reading. We can offer you this easier, more convenient alternative to cassettes and find you some books that you will enjoy. We look forward to seeing many inactive patrons "come out of the woodwork".

If you are enjoying your digital player—or your Talking Book service in general—we know you don't want to keep your enjoyment to yourself. As they say in retail, satisfied customers are the best advertisement. 
